SPRING 2023 - PROGRAMS

Dr. Given Harper, Programs

JWP Audubon will co-sponsor two presentations in the spring of 2023. Both presentations will be held in room C101 of the Center for Natural Sciences (CNS), Illinois Wesleyan University, 201 Beecher Street, Bloomington, IL 61701. Parking is available in the lot north of the CNS.



On March 23 at 7 p.m., Dr. Ebony Murrell, an alum of both Illinois Wesleyan University and Illinois State University, will give a talk on "New roots for fallowed ground: developing sustainable perennial grains agriculture." Cereal grains provide approximately half of the calories we consume worldwide. About 12% of land on Earth is devoted to cereal grain production, most of which exists in what were once highly diverse, perennial grasslands. Annual tillage and replanting have led to soil erosion, loss of biodiversity, and reduction in ecosystem services. How can we rebuild soils and ecological systems in these farmlands while also feeding humans? For more than forty years The Land Institute, a nonprofit organization in Kansas, has embarked on the mission to develop diverse, perennial grains systems. Join Dr. Ebony Murrell, a Crop Protection Ecologist at The Land Institute, as she provides an overview of the research conducted by the Land Institute and global partners on perennial grains systems, and give updates on new and upcoming commercial perennial grains such as Kernza®, perennial rice, and sainfoin grain.

On April 6, at 7 p.m., Jennifer Kuroda, the founder of the Illinois Bobcat Foundation, will give a talk on "The Bobcat - Illinois' Native Cat." Bobcats, named for their short, bobbed tail, are about twice the size of a common house cat and use their keen sight and hearing to hunt rabbits, squirrels, small rodents, and birds. They are mostly nocturnal, reclusive animals that prefer forested or wooded areas. Once hunted almost to extinction in the Midwestern U.S., bobcats have been making a comeback over the past 40 years. The program will cover many facets of these native cats, including historical data, bobcat biology, human predator perception, bobcat management, and information about the ongoing bobcat population studies in Illinois.

2022 Christmas Bird Count Results:

The Bloomington-Normal 17 December 2022 Christmas Bird Count resulted in 60 species found within the 15-mile diameter count circle that day. This is the lowest we have had since 2018 (59) despite having excellent coverage with 25 observers in 10 field parties and 3 feeders. 2010-2020 average: 69 and range: 58-78. Lack of waterfowl diversity despite open water and missed several land birds that are usual.

Significant finds were the following: 1 Black-bellied Whistling Duck (first ever for the count; only recently added to the county list; at Miller Park. Pictured below), 27 Bald Eagles (a new high; multiple parties), 1 Sharp-shinned Hawk (rare in winter), 1 Wilson's Snipe (rare this late), 111 Horned Larks (high number), and all three species of swans (Mute, Trumpeter, Tundra). Only two irruptive species this year: Red-breasted Nuthatch and Purple Finch.


